Beef & Dairy Cattle Rules

VETERINARIAN IN CHARGE All animals must meet the State Health Requirements.
Official Veterinarian shall be the sole judge as to the fitness of all animals.

1. Entries close per general rule B-9. Entries shall be made in the name of the bona-fide owner.
2. Entry fee is 10% of 1st place premium unless stated otherwise. Do not make entries in Champion Classes.
3. Exhibitors must purchase an exhibitors pass or a membership.
4. All cattle must be on the fairgrounds before 11:59 p.m. on Monday July 10, 2023.
5. Cattle will be released at 7:00 p.m. the last day of Fair.
6. The Director(s) in charge have the right to refuse any entry: due to but not limited to health of animal and space available.
7. No bedding or feed will be furnished by the Fair Board.
8. Exhibitors are responsible for keeping their area clean and to deposit manure in dumpsters provided.
9. All feed, equipment & suppliers will be delivered between 11:00 p.m. and 10:00 a.m.
10. All necessary health and registration papers must accompany animals and be shown upon request.
11. NO horns allowed per ODA veterinarian.
12. Entries will not be accepted unless animals are registered, Crossbred beef cattle shall be the only exception. All registered cattle shall have a legible tattoo(s) or other means of permanent identification consistent with breeds registration certificate. Crossbred beef cattle shall have a permanent ear tag. If an animal has a microchip as its permanent identification, the exhibitor is responsible for providing a microchip reader.
13. All bulls older than calf classes must be shown with a nose ring or bull lead.
14. Tampering and/or misrepresentation as to breeding, age, ownership, custody and any irregularity in showing will be considered fraud and deception. To maintain a high degree of confidence and integrity in the livestock shows, the Trumbull County Agricultural Society reserves the right to disqualify any animal and/or exhibitor in violation. Any premiums won by such exhibitor will be
14. (cont) forfeited and exhibitor may be barred from exhibiting at the Trumbull County Fair in the future.
15. In dairy classes, the judge may require any cow to be milked while in the ring or before awards are presented.
16. An animal may only be shown in one breed class or crossbreed class but not in both.
17. Exhibitor is limited to two entries per class and one entry in each group class.
18. All cattle, except market livestock, must be vaccinated for BVD, IBR, P13, BRVS and LEPTO 5, at least two weeks prior to Fair.
19. No blindfolds or sedatives may be used on any animal. This includes tranquilizers, CBD products, show calm or similar products.
20. There must be at least five animals entered for a new section to be considered.
21. All cattle must be presented in the show ring in order to receive premiums or awards.
22. Posted stall assignments are final.
23. Aisles across center of barns shall remain open at all times.
24. All livestock trucks and/or trailers left on the fairgrounds during the week of fair MUST be parked in the lot north of the maintenance building (#13)
25. When presenting cattle in the show ring, all exhibitors shall wear proper attire.
26. Red & White Holsteins must conform to Red & White Assn. color guidelines to be accepted for the division
27. The cattle superintendent has the right to assign stalls by the animals exhibited rather than the animals entered.
28. Any yearling fresh prior to the show will be shown in the Junior 2 class.

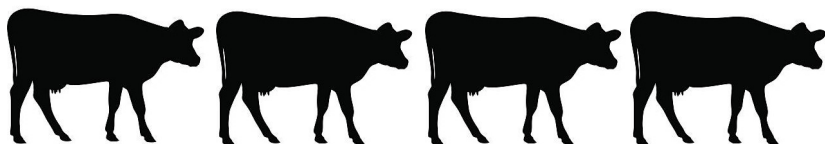

2023 Buckeye Horse Pullers Association of Ohio Rules

1. The distance for each pull will be 27 feet. Distances less than 27 feet will be used to determine the winner of placement at the end of the contest. The best distance will break ties.
2. The distance between the side boundaries will be at least 18 feet. Teams must stay within the side boundaries while pulling. If a horse touches the rope or chalk line regardless, it disqualifies the pull unless the back judge blows for a full distance or stoppage of the prior to the rope being touched.
3. The drivers will have six tries to get hitched (1st and 2nd pull attempts). If they miss all six they will be eliminated from the contest. You must take a first or second pull to be permitted to a third pull.
4. A teamster receives two attempts at each weight. A teamster may choose to unhitch and rehook on their 2nd and final attempt.
5. You will have three minutes to attempt to make your first pull. Time starts when the announcer calls your name. You will have three minutes between your first and final attempt. If you do not get hooked on your first attempt, a second is not given.
6. The first pull will be in the direction indicated by the judges. A 2nd pull may be taken in either direction providing enough room remains on the track. If a team is hooked to the sled and keeps bumping it, they may have to go the same direction even if they have passed the turn around point.
7. Any forward movement of the load after the driver gives the command to go will be counted as a pull and measurements will be recorded except in case of a breakdown, which entitles the team to take another pull. Judges will determine if a breakdown allows a new attempt at the same load, without counting towards the first or second attempt.
8. A whistle or signal shall be given when the team has made the distance or committed an error the fulfilling distance. The driver must stop the team immediately after the signal.
9. No heading is allowed at any time a horse is inside the ropes. If the horses get tangled and need to be headed, they must unhook and leave the sled and hook back on for the same pull. Teamsters must have the judge's approval to unhook. If a bit needs changed during the pull, the driver and two helpers only can change the bit on the track. Otherwise they must go back to the sidelines with clock running, where more teamsters can assist. Violation of this rule will cause the team to lose the pull.
10. Each team shall be driven by the same driver through the entire contest, except in the case of any injury or if the contestants choose to switch drivers. This can only be done on a first attempt to hitch to a new load, and only with the judge's approval. You can only make a change in drivers one time. Each driver will be allowed two helpers in hitching and one helper on the lines at anytime.

11. Drivers and helpers shall not prod, hit or touch the horses while pulling, no petting or touching the horse after they are hooked to the sled. Only the driver can command the horses. The driver shall have reasonable tight lines, and in no case will a driver be allowed to whirl or shake lines over the horses or above his own head while pulling. No driver will be allowed to jump the doubletrees while horses are pulling. Drivers may drive from the front of the doubletrees.
12. A contestant shall be disqualified by the judges or officers or board if there is:
 - a. Undue abuse or treatment to horses on or off the pulling track
 - b. Undue profanity
 - c. Any needle usage unless by a licensed vet, on the pulling track.
13. If any team is unmanageable or difficult to handle in the opinion of the judges, officers or board, they will be disqualified and ordered to be taken from the field. If a team is disqualified and taken from the field, their prize money will be forfeited.
14. Any team may be subject to blood or urine test. Sponsors (fair boards) have the right to test any horse at their discretion. The Association will support the sponsors (fair boards) providing the testing is done properly. The sponsors (fair boards) have the power to bar any teamster from their next year's event. Maximum bar time is the following year.
15. Teams will draw for positions for pulling order one hour before the pull. No late entry once a pair had taken their final pull.
16. In the event of breakdown, the teamster must repair the break down and pull in order.
17. A pull will be disqualified if there are any bits, chains, ropes, or extras hanging harness on the horses. All teamsters will pull with blinds on the bridles.
18. Scales for weighing will open 2½ hours before the pull starts. The scale will close ½ hour before the start of any pull. The horses that are pulled together must be weighed together. A designated weigh master must do weighting at the time and place designated before the pull. An official will hold horses while the horses are being weighed. Once a team qualifies for the light weight class, each horse will have a mark for verification. Division weight will be 3700 pounds and under: overweight. No baling twine halters allowed. Each team is allowed across the scales 1 time.
19. There must be a 1st place winner determined at the sled. A pull can't end with all final pairs passing. Two blocks will be added for the new load in the event of pairs quitting.
 - A. If 2 teams quit on the same load, they will split the prize money.
20. No horse shall pull in more than one class at the same contest.
21. If at any anytime during the pulling track has developed a bad spot, judges can shorten, lengthen or move the track after weight has been added.
22. No horses shall be tied to trailers during the duration of the pull.
23. You must be a member to pull in the North East Ohio Horse Pullers Association. If someone other than the team owner drives the team in a pull, the driver must also be a member. Membership dues are \$20.00 per year. Members waive their rights to legal action against the Association or it judges, officers and Board of Directors per their membership card statement.
24. Teams will be weighed at every contest.

4. Accessories, bases and backgrounds may be used only at the exhibitor's own risk.
5. Only one entry in class permitted, unless the class is subdivided.



6. All entries in Horticulture Specimen classes must be grown by the exhibitor and should be labeled as to variety. Houseplants must have been in exhibitor's possession at least three months (Junior & High School Division – at least 45 days). Horticulture specimen should be show quality and groomed. (Clean container, free of bugs)
7. No native grown conservation materials are to be used in any exhibit.
8. The committee will furnish containers for Horticulture Specimen classes.
9. No artificial fruit, nuts, vegetables, foliage or flowers will be permitted in any class unless class states otherwise.
10. There will be A+, A & B Divisions in each arrangement class. A+ is for advanced arrangers and judges who have won more than 5 Rosettes (Tri-color, etc.) A is for advanced arrangers and judges who have won less than 5 Rosettes. B is for those who have heretofore won a first place (blue) ribbon in a Trumbull County Garden Forum Show.
11. All arrangements must contain some plant material.
12. Artistic arrangements should not exceed 30" in width and no higher than 48".
13. Painted or tinted material allowed only where award permits.
14. The Junior Division is for ages 12 and under.
15. Junior High and High School Division: Ages 13-18
16. Cut Specimens, no foliage below the water line. Double potting is permitted if inner pot seen.
17. Please check rules before entering.
18. All properties should be labeled with the owner's name. Trumbull County Garden Forum Show Committee will exercise all possible care but cannot be responsible for loss or damage.



AWARDS

1. **ONE FIRST PLACE** (blue ribbon), one second place (red ribbon), and one third place (yellow ribbon), may be awarded in each class. One or more honorable mention (white) may be awarded for exceptionally high quality exhibits in a class or sub-class.
2. **TRI-COLOR AWARD:** An award to be given to an arrangement with fresh cut material predominating and point scoring at least 95 points. Accessories permitted. Rosette of blue, red and yellow ribbons.
3. **AWARD OF DISTINCTION:** An award may be given to an arrangement consisting of dried, treated, tinted or glycerized or a combination of these materials. Accessories permitted. Rosette of brown ribbons with gold lettering.
4. **CREATIVITY AWARD:** An award may be given to an arrangement point scoring at least 95 which uses a combination of fresh and dried material. Creativity must be one of the qualities in the scale of points. Any arrangement in schedule may receive this award if they qualify. Rosette of purple ribbons.
5. **PETITE AWARD:** An award given for a miniature or small design in a specified section of the Flower Show. Small rosette of blue and white ribbons.
6. **AWARD OF HORTICULTURE EXCELLENCE:** An award may be given only to a named exhibit of fresh plant material judged as the finest in the entire Horticulture Division. Rosette of green, orange, blue ribbons.
7. **ARBOREAL AWARD:** It is a section award and may be given to an exhibit of fresh plant material in a section composed of tree or shrub branches. Rosette of two value of green ribbons.
8. **AWARD OF MERIT:** Is a section award and may be given in the cut specimen division and one in the house plant division if exhibit warrants it. Rosette of orange ribbons.
9. **COLLECTOR'S SHOWCASE:** It is a section award and may be given to a display or collection of fresh plant materials, with no fewer than five specimens or no fewer than five container-grown plants of one family or no fewer than five with like characteristics. Each specimen within the exhibit must score 95 points or more. The specimens must be properly named as specified in the schedule. Rosette of brown and green ribbons.
10. **SWEEPSTAKES AWARD:** It will be given in the Artistic and Horticulture Divisions. It is a rosette of green and white ribbons.
11. **HIGH SCHOOL GARDENERS AWARD:** May be offered and awarded to an outstanding horticulture, design, or educational exhibit in the High School Division and must score 90 points or more. One award may be given in each of the categories above, for a total of three. Rosette of red and white ribbons.

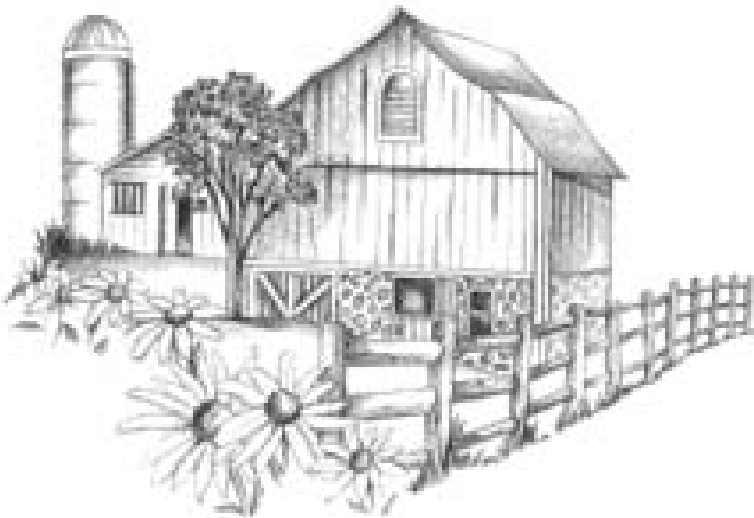

Goat Department Rules

Official ADGA Show-ADGA Rules shall Govern

1. Entries close per general rule B-9. Entries shall be made in the name of the bona-fide owner.
2. Entry fee is 10% of first place premium. Exhibitor must purchase an exhibitor pass or membership pass.
3. The director in charge have the right to refuse any entry, due to but not limit to health of animal and space available.
4. The base date recording the age of the animal is July 1, 2021. Exhibitor(s) are limited to **TWO** entries per individual class(es) and one entry in each group class. Animals must be shown in individual classes in order to show in a group class. **Group classes are not ADGA approved.**
5. **Do not make entries in Champion , Best of Breed and Best of Show Classes.**
6. All goats shall have a permanent legible tattoo(s), (ear or tail) or microchip. The only exception shall be market Wethers, which shall have a legible ear tag.
7. All livestock must enter gate D and be in place by 11:59 pm on Monday, July 10, 2023 and remain until 7pm on Sunday July 16, 2023.
8. No bedding or feed will be furnished by the fair board. All feed, equipment and supplies must be delivered between the hours of 11pm & 10 am.
9. **All buck goats are barred from the fairgrounds EXCEPT an infant buck (buckling) born ON or AFTER May 26, 2023 shall be permitted to accompany its siblings(s) and lactating mother to the fair for its nutritional welfare only. Buckling and documentation of birth shall be presented to the goat committee and or fair veterinarian upon request.**
10. Horns on goats should be of breed standard.
11. ADGA original registration papers are required on all goats over 6 months of age. Papers will be checked per ADGA rules prior to the ADGA show by the show secretary at check in. Goats under 6 months of age must have a stamped duplicate registration papers. Show order is subject to change.
12. Adhering to USDA SCRAPIES REGULATIONS, all goats must be identified with either an official scrapies ear tag OR an assigned unique tattoo. Refer to complete USDA or ODA regulations on website.
13. All goats presented for exhibition must show no evidence of Contagious Lymphadenitis (superficial abscess), Contagious Exthyma (sore mouth), foot rot or and other contagious or infectious disease. Unhealthy animals will be dismissed at the discretion of the committee in charge.
14. Tampering and/or misrepresentation as to breeding, age, ownership, custody and any other irregularity in showing will be considered fraud and deception. To maintain a high degree of confidence and integrity in the livestock show. The Trumbull County Agricultural Society reserves the right to disqualify any animal.
15. Each exhibitor must comply with the Ohio Livestock Coalition "Code of Practices"
16. **The committee reserves the right to combine classes and/or sections due to limited entries.** There must be at least (10) animals entered for a new section to be considered. Each breed must have a minimum of (10) animals exhibiting the following year or the section will be re-evaluated for inclusion.
17. Senior & Jr. Does not separately sanctioned.
18. **Market Goats shall be Wethers only.** Junior Fair Market Goat rules shall apply where applicable.
19. All Best of Breed Senior Doe winners are required to milk out for "Best Senior Doe in Show".
20. All livestock trucks and/or trailers left on the fairgrounds during the week of the fair **MUST BE** parked in the lot north of the maintenance building(#13).

10. **Market Lambs (One class-ALL BREEDS)** Limited to two entries per exhibitor. Market Lambs must weigh a minimum of 80 pounds.
11. Wool class-Fleeces exhibited will be judged from the standard of Market requirement for each breed. All wool exhibited must be shown within the year shorn. All fleeces entered in the show must have been grown on sheep owned by exhibitor and shown under his name. Exhibitors are limited to two entries per class. Fleeces will be displayed in the educational building. Release time is 7:00 p.m., the last day of the fair.

CONSTITUTION

TRUMBULL COUNTY AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY

Article I - INCORPORATION

- Section 1:** The name of the Corporation is Trumbull County Agricultural Society (the "Corporation").
- Section 2:** The location of the principal office is Cortland, Ohio, Trumbull County.
- Section 3:** The Corporation is organized and shall be operated exclusively for charitable and educational purposes, specifically in furtherance of the organizational mission to improve agriculture and horticultural production, encourage education of the general public as to agriculture, livestock, home economics, and to promote general community betterment together with all industrial, commercial, educational and other related interests of Trumbull County, Ohio, as deemed proper in accordance with the rules and regulations set forth by the Ohio Department of Agriculture. The Corporation expects to engage in the following activities, among others, in furtherance of its charitable purposes:
1. To acquire or receive from any persons, firms, associations, corporations, trusts or foundations by deed, gift, purchase, bequest, devise or otherwise, cash or securities and other property, real and personal, and holding, administering, managing, investing, reinvesting and disbursing the principal and income thereof for the purposes stated in these Articles of Incorporation; and
 2. Doing whatever is deemed necessary, useful, advisable or conducive either directly or through one or more affiliated organizations, to effectuate the purposes of the Corporation, including the exercise of all other authority and powers permitted to corporations generally by virtue of the provisions of the Ohio Nonprofit Corporation Law, except as expressly provided otherwise in these Articles of Incorporation

The Corporation shall carry on only such activities as are consonant with the purposes set forth in this Article Third. No part of the net earnings of the Corporation shall inure to the benefit of any Incorporator, Member, or Director of the Corporation, or of any other private individual, except that the Corporation is authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the purposes set forth in this Article Third. No substantial part of the activities of the Corporation shall consist of carrying on propaganda or otherwise attempting to influence legislation; and no activity of the Corporation shall consist of participating in or intervening in (including the publishing or distributing of statements), any political campaign on behalf of or in opposition to any candidate for public office.

It is intended that the Corporation shall have the status of an organization which is exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, (i) contributions to which are deductible for federal income tax purposes under Section 171(c)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code and (ii) gifts and bequests to which are deductible for federal gift tax and federal estate tax purposes under Section 2522(a)(2) and Section 2055(a)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code, respectively, for so long as such taxes apply. These Articles of Incorporation shall be construed, and all authority and activities of the Corporation shall be limited, accordingly

Article II - MISSION STATEMENT

- Section 1:** The mission statement of this Society shall be to promote and encourage agriculture, industry, science, art and other interests of Trumbull County which the Board deems proper and in the best interest of the community.

Article III - MEMBERSHIP

- Section 1:** Any resident 18 years of age or older of Trumbull County may become a member of this Society by paying annually the membership fee fixed by the Board of Directors. Must present a valid Driver's License or a State of Ohio Photo ID.
- Section 2:** No person shall pay for or secure more than one such membership and that membership shall be for herself/himself. No memberships shall be issued to corporations, organizations, partnerships, or firms.

Article IV - BOARD OF DIRECTORS

- Section 1:** The management shall consist of a Board of 15 members, who shall be elected for a term of three years and the terms so arranged that the terms of one-third of the members shall expire annually.
- Section 2:** Any vacancy caused by death, resignation, removal from office, or other causes, may be filled by the Board until the next annual election, when a director shall be elected for the unexpired term.
- Section 3:** All Board of Director's must purchase their membership by December (first month of Societies fiscal year) regular monthly meeting. If a Director's membership expires, voting rights will be revoked and monetary compensation will be suspended until a membership is secured.

Article V - ELECTION

- Section 1:** The annual election of the Board of Directors will be held on the 3rd Saturday of September from 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m.
- Section 2:** The said election shall be from ballot. Ballots must be marked with an "X" opposite the name of each candidate voted for; otherwise, the ballot will not be counted.
- Section 3:** Ballots marked with more than five candidates will not be counted, only exception will be to fill a vacant term.
- Section 4:** Only persons holding memberships in good standing at the close of the annual Fair may vote.
- Section 5:** Members of the Society must declare their candidacy for the office of Director of the Society by filing with the Secretary of the Society, a petition signed by ten (10) or more members of the Society who are residents of the County in which the Society is organized, at least ten (10) calendar days before the annual election of Directors, and must be in the Secretary's office by 4 p.m. Only regularly nominated candidates who met the filing requirements will be eligible for election as a Director.
- Section 6:** The term of office of the retiring Directors shall expire, and that of the Directors- Elect shall begin, seven (7) days after the Annual Meeting and Election of the Society each year, or until their successors are elected and sworn in.
- Section 7:** All Society Members will be notified of any proposed Constitutional Amendments, provided a list of candidates running for Director, and given the exact date and time polls will open and close, prior to the annual meeting.

Article VI - ANNUAL MEETING OF THE MEMBERSHIP

- Section 1:** The Annual Meeting of the members of the Society shall be held in the Fair Board Office on the third Saturday of September at 11:00 a.m.
- Section 2:** At this meeting, the officers and directors of the Society shall make reports to the membership of the Society concerning the past Fair and make recommendations for the betterment of future Fairs. The members shall be given opportunities to make suggestions and recommendations for the improvement of the Society and its Fair. Such other business may be presented as may be prescribed by this Constitution or as may be deemed proper by the Board of Directors.

Article VII - ORGANIZATION AND MEETINGS

- Section 1:** The Board of Directors shall meet annually within fourteen (14) calendar days after the annual meeting and election each year, and elect a President, 1st Vice President, 2nd Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer. The President, Vice Presidents, and the Treasurer shall serve one (1) year, and the Secretary not more than three (3) years as the Board may determine, and until their successors are elected and qualified.
- Section 2:** The President and Vice Presidents shall be Directors. The Secretary and the Treasurer may or may not be Directors.
- Section 3:** Before election of officers, the newly elected Directors shall qualify by taking the following oath (for affirmation) before a competent authority (designated by law).

Article VIII - AMENDMENTS

- Section 1:** Amendments to the Constitution or By-Laws may be proposed by:
- A.** A majority of the Board of Directors at a scheduled meeting voting in favor of placing an amendment on the ballot.
- B.** Filing a petition with the Secretary of the Society at least seven (7) calendar days prior to the Annual Meeting of the membership of the Society. Said petition must set forth the proposed amendment and be signed by not less than twenty-five (25) members with addresses.
- Section 2:** If an amendment is proposed, it shall be submitted to the membership of the Society at the annual meeting of the membership of the Society.
- Section 3:** When more than one amendment shall be submitted at the time, they shall be so submitted as to enable the members to vote on each amendment separately.
- Section 4:** If the majority of the membership voting on the proposed amendment shall adopt such amendment, it shall become a part of the Constitution or By-Laws.

Article IX - COMPENSATION

- Section 1:** The compensation of Board members shall be fixed by the Board in accordance with the Rules of the Ohio Department of Agriculture.

ARTICLE X - BONDS

- Section 1:** The Secretary shall post a surety bond in the amount of \$3,000 minimum or more payable to the Society, conditioned upon the faithful performance of the duties of her/his office.
- Section 2:** The Treasurer shall post a surety bond on the amount of \$5,000 minimum or more payable to the Society, conditioned upon the faithful performance of the duties of her/his office.

ARTICLE XI - FAIR DATES

- Section 1:** The Board of Directors shall fix the dates for the Annual Exposition of the Society, subject to the approval of the Ohio Director of Agriculture.

- BY LAWS -

ARTICLE I - QUORUM

- Section 1:** A majority of the members of the Board of Directors shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business of the Society.

Article II - MEETINGS

- Section 1:** The regular meeting of the Board of Directors shall be the third Thursday of each month at 7:00 p.m. at the Fair Grounds Office.
- Section 2:** Special meetings may be held when necessary at the call of the President, or at the call of the Secretary upon the written request of the Secretary by not less than 4 members of the Board of Directors.
- Section 3:** Written notice of special meetings of the Board of Directors shall be delivered personally to each Director or sent to each Director by mail, email or telephone at least twenty-four hours before the meeting. Such notice, however, may be waived by any Director either before or after the meeting. The notice needs to specify the purpose of the meeting.
- Section 4:** The Board has the ability to accept a director's attendance.
- Section 5:** If a Board member misses three (3) consecutive regular meetings, they are automatically terminated from the Board. The formal termination notice shall be forwarded to said Board member by the Secretary.

Article III - ORDER OF BUSINESS

- Section 2:** The order of business may be temporarily suspended at any meeting upon a majority vote of a quorum present.

Article IV - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

- Section 1:** It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all meetings of the Board, to appoint committees, countersign all orders for the disbursement of funds, and to perform such other duties as are determined by the Board.
- Section 2:** It shall be the duty of the Secretary to:
1. Keep a list of all members of the Society;
 2. Keep accurately a record of all proceedings of the Society and the Board;
 3. Notify all members of the Board of the time and place of all special meetings;
 4. Give the members of the Society notice of the time and place of the Annual Election of the Board of Directors and the Annual Meeting of the Membership;
 5. Review the account of all monies that may come into the Society.
 6. Review itemized account of all receipts and expenditures of money;
 7. Review and sign the Annual Report to the Ohio Department of Agriculture;
 8. Perform such other duties as are determined by the Board.
- Section 3:** It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to:
1. Review account of all receipts and disbursements;
 2. Pay such orders as may be countersigned by the President and the Secretary;
 3. Will be responsible for making fair week deposits
 4. Review and sign the Annual Report to the Ohio Department of Agriculture;
 5. Perform other duties as are determined by the Board.

Article V - RULES

The Board of Directors may enact such Rules and Regulations for conducting the business of the Society which do not conflict with the Constitution or By-Laws, Regulations of the Ohio Department of Agriculture, or laws of the State of Ohio.

GENERAL RULES

A. MEMBERSHIPS

1. Memberships to the Society can be purchased for a fee of \$25.00. Purchasers must be of legal voting age and must be a resident of Trumbull County.
2. Memberships entitle the member entrance to the grounds and free grandstands when applicable and voting privileges at the Annual Meeting and Election.
3. Memberships are on sale at the Secretary's Office starting December 1 of current year during regular office hours and the week of Fair. During fair week the office is open 9:00 am... to 9:00 p.m.... No memberships will be sold after 9:00 pm. on the last day of Fair.



B. ENTRIES

1. All entries must be made in the name of the bona fide owner or owners. In the Animal Get or Sire and/or the Produce of Dam, ownership shall not be required. All articles must have been made, grown, or produced since the last Fair; otherwise premiums will be withheld. When a herd is registered in the names of different members of a family and where the herd is one unit, all entries may be considered as the result of one exhibitor.
2. If it is ascertained that any exhibitor has made or caused to be made, any false statement in regard to any entry, or interfered with any of the judges, he shall be excluded from all competitions and forfeit all premiums awarded.
3. Any person making an entry in a department, with the exception of the Educational and Speed Horse Departments, will be required to pay an entry fee equal to ten percent (10%) of the first place money, for each entry. A minimum entry fee, per department is 50 cents. All exhibitors are required to purchase an exhibitors pass, or a membership. This same formula applies to Junior Fair entries in open classes.
4. Open-class Exhibitors, even as a business or a firm, are entitled to only one exhibitor's ticket. A Weekly Fair Pass can be purchased in unlimited quantity.
5. Exhibitor's passes are \$18.00. Weekly Fair passes are \$23.00. These passes entitle the owner entrance to the grounds and the free grandstand. They do not constitute membership in the Society and have no voting privileges.
6. All animals and articles must be in place by 11:59 pm. on Monday July 11, 2022 at which time the Exhibition will be considered formally opened. All animals must be on the grounds for display until 8:00 p.m. the last day of the Fair. All other exhibits and machinery must remain until after 10:00 p.m. the last day of the Fair. Any exceptions of these rules must be made by the Director in charge of that department, or a forfeiture of premium will be the result.
7. All protests from exhibitors will be deferred until the first meeting after the Fair; and must be made according to State rules.
8. Awarding committees may award premiums as the exhibit animal may be deemed worthy, or none if unworthy. The member in charge may require proof of ownership on any doubtful or disputed point.
9. All entries in all departments will close on June 25, 2022 at 4:00 p.m. at the fair office, or entries postmarked on or before June 25, 2022.
10. No bedding or feed will be furnished for livestock of any kind, by the Fair Board.
11. The Society reserves the right to pay the premium which may be awarded for exhibition, pro rata, provided there are not sufficient funds after paying current expenses in the treasury to pay in full.
12. All premiums will be paid within 30 days of the last day of the Fair.
13. A violation of any of the foregoing rules prefacing any of the classes, or stated herein, on the part of the exhibitor will make premiums void.
14. All animals are to enter at Gate D.
15. Trumbull County Agricultural Society will provide adequate security during the Fair, but will not be responsible for articles lost or stolen.
16. **ALL PREMIUM CHECKS NOT CASHED WITHIN 60 DAYS WILL NOT BE RE-ISSUED .**

C. DIRECTORS

1. The Board shall hold regular daily sessions during the Fair, at the Secretary's Office, when all matters pertaining will be heard.
2. A majority of the members of the Board, with the President or Vice President, shall constitute a quorum to transact business.
3. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to exercise a general supervision of affairs of the Society, during the recess of the Society. They shall have authority to act on all matters of interest to the Society, if not in session.
4. Superintendents in charge of the various departments and classes shall be named by the President.
5. No action, decision, or ruling of an officer shall be considered binding on the Board, except if it is in accordance with all the Rules governing the Board and the Exhibition, or a duly constituted committee empowered by the Board.
6. The Superintendent of Grounds shall take charge and have full control of the grounds and rent of same, subject to instructions of the Board, or Executive Committee, paying all monies received by him/her to the Secretary, taking his/her receipt for same.
7. It is the duty of the Superintendents of the several departments to post themselves on the Rules and be able to instruct their awarding committees correctly, see that awards are made and entered as first and second premiums in their proper column in the Judge's book.

D. MISCELLANEOUS

1. No person will be allowed to engage in any business, traffic or exhibition on the grounds without a permit from the Secretary or President.
2. Persons renting privileges of any kind on the Fair Grounds will be required to pay in advance to receive notice of location. Any such privilege cannot be sublet without permission of the Superintendent of Grounds or the Secretary. The selling of a concession does not constitute the selling of the right to a location on the Trumbull County Fair Grounds.
3. Disorderly conduct of any kind is forbidden. Those indulging therein will forfeit their right to remain on the grounds and will be promptly ejected. Any person being banished from activities (examples: demo derby, truck and tractor pulls, horse pulls, etc.) will be done at a regular meeting by the Board of Directors for a period of up to five (5) years, if the Board so motions and this procedure

- may continue until the Board feels the banishment has been long enough to fit the conduct.
4. The Trumbull County Agricultural Society shall not sell, or permit for sale unless approved by the board for one (1) week prior to, or three (3) days after our Fair; any spirituous, vinous, or malt liquors.
 5. Every precaution will be taken to prevent accidents to persons, animals, and vehicles, but the Society will not be responsible for any accidents that may occur.
 6. The Trumbull County Fair Board will not be held responsible for any type of entertainment canceled due to circumstances beyond our control.
 7. No fire arms to be allowed on the fairgrounds property at any time with the exception of state certified commissioned peace officers and non-uniform police officers. All non-uniform police officers carrying a concealed weapon must verify proof of certification with the fair office or sheriff's office before entering the fairgrounds.
 8. Positively no swimming pools allowed on fairgrounds except for duck ponds and vendor displays.
 9. Petitions to declare candidacy for Society Director will be available at the Fair office on the first business day of August..
 10. Per ORC 901-5-15
 - A) No person shall use society funds, facilities or employees:
 - (1) To promote the candidacy of any member who seeks election or re-election to the board of directors of the society; or
 - (2) To influence the votes of members upon any amendment to the constitution or by-laws of the society which is submitted as provided by regulation 901-5-08.
 - (3) No person employed by a society shall engage in any of the activities specified in this rule.
- Rule Amplifies: ORC 901.06, ORC 1711.07 and ORC 1711.08
11. Three-way tie procedure: Three-way coin flips are possible, by a different process this can be done either to choose two out of three, or to choose one out of three. To choose two out of three, three coins are flipped and if two coins come up the same and one different, the different one loses (is out), leaving two players. To choose one out of three, either reverse this (the odd coin out is the winner), or add a regular two-way coin flip between the remaining players as a second step. Note that the three-way flip is 75% likely to work each time it is tried (if all coins are heads or all tails, which occurs 1/4 of the time. The flip is repeated until the results differ), and does not require that "heads" or "tails" be called.
 12. The proper heavy duty "UL" 12 gauge approved outdoor extension cords must be used in all barns.
 13. Directors have the right to have generators turned off.
- E. JUDGES – INSTRUCTIONS & SUGGESTIONS**
1. You are respectfully requested to report each day and prove your attendance, not later than 9:00 a.m., at the Secretary's Office.
 2. You may recommend, but not award, premiums on articles not enumerated in the premium list.
 3. Pay no attention to articles or animals that have information and/or advertising attached.
 4. Permit no person to interfere with your examination or deliberations.
 5. Awards in the livestock department are to be made by the one judge system where possible, and no judges can be employed two years in succession, unless sanctioned by the Board. Other departments to be left to the discretion of the Superintendent in charge.
- F. JUDGING AND PROTESTS**
1. All exhibitors, parents, and representatives are expected to show respect and courtesy to judges. Violations may result in disqualifying the exhibitor. Qualified judges will judge all exhibits. Decision of the judge is final.
 2. Tampering in any form will not be tolerated.
 3. Any participant and/or representative attempting to interfere with judges before, during or after their event will cause the participant to be disqualified from participation. In the event of a discourteous or unethical act to a judge or official of the Fair, recourse may be barring an exhibitor, participant or their representative and will forfeit all entry fees and any prize money, trophies, awards, that may have been awarded to them and return of sale money to the buyer.
 4. All protests must be filed by the Exhibitor in writing.
 5. If anyone contests any classification or regulation, the issue must be presented before the Director in charge and/or Junior Fair Coordinator for consideration BEFORE the show begins.
 6. **PROTESTS:**
 - a. All protests must be in writing, accompanied by an affidavit setting forth the grounds for protesting. Protests against an exhibitor of either an animal or article must be filed with the Secretary of the Senior Fair Board on the day of the contest.
 - b. A \$100 protest fee must be paid to the Trumbull County Agricultural Society at the time the protest is made in writing. The Society will retain the \$100 fee if the protest is not sustained. The board shall hear protests with the Director of the department involved and if necessary other people will be involved as designated by the Board. All protests will be considered at a time set by the Board of the Trumbull County Agricultural Society and all parties will be notified.
 - c. The Junior Fair exhibitor may protest with a \$50 fee and request an informal hearing before representatives of the Junior Fair Board, Senior Fair Board, and 4-H Educator at which time, he/she will be given the opportunity to challenge the reasons for the intended disqualification(s) or rule. The hearing may take place immediately. The President of the Senior Fair Board shall call the Appeals Committee together. The specie committee who ordered, caused, or requested the disqualification or rule shall be present at the hearing. All judges rulings are final.
 7. **Disciplinary Actions for Violations of Rules**
 - a. Any person who violates a provision of the Fair Rules or the rules of the State of Ohio Livestock Exhibition Rules may be subject to any of the following disciplinary actions: Disqualification from any exhibition; Disqualification of the exhibition livestock from any exhibition; Continuing education; Written letter of reprimand; Forfeiture or return of awards, prizes, premiums, or proceeds; Pre and/or Post-exhibition drug testing (shall be paid by party filing the complaint); BANISHMENT and or Other Disciplinary Actions as determined by the Senior Fair Board.
 - b. Disqualification may include any or all shows and classes and may be for any number of years.
 - c. All violations of the rules are serious and the severity of the violation will determine the level of the disciplinary action. The Senior Fair Board has the final determination on the severity of the violation and the severity of the disciplinary action.

2023 Livestock Health Exhibition Rules

ALL REQUIRED ANIMALS COMING TO THE TRUMBULL COUNTY FAIR MUST BE VACCINATED FOR RABIES BY A LICENSED VETERINARIAN.

901:1-18-01 • CHAPTER'S APPLICATION

- (A) Animals listed in this chapter when moved or imported into Ohio for exhibition purposes only shall comply with the requirements of this chapter and when in compliance with the provisions of this chapter shall, with the exception of rules governing movement and importation of quarantined animals, be exempt from any other rules governing movement within or importation into Ohio.
- (B) Animals moved within or imported into Ohio for any purpose in addition to exhibition shall meet all movement and import requirements of Chapter 901:1-17 of the Administrative Code.

901:1-18-02 • DEFINITION

As used in this chapter:

- (A) "Exhibition" means any public show of animals which is sponsored by or under the control of an Ohio county or independent agricultural society organized under chapter 1711. of the revised code: or the Ohio state fair: or which is assembled for a period which exceeds thirty-six hours or contains animals of origins other than Ohio.
- (B) "Certificate of veterinary inspection" means a form from the state of origin which has been issued and completed by a licensed and accredited veterinarian attesting to the health status and identification of an animal listed thereon.
- (C) "Approved veterinarian" means any licensed and accredited veterinarian approved by the Ohio department of agriculture, or an employee of the Ohio department of agriculture or the United States department of agriculture, animal plant health inspection service, veterinary services.
- (D) "Licensed and accredited veterinarian" means a person who is licensed by the State of Ohio to practice veterinary medicine and who is certified by the United States department of agriculture, animal plant health inspection services, veterinary services to be an accredited veterinarian.
- (E) "Residue" means any poisonous or deleterious pesticide governed by 40 C.F.R. 180, any poisonous or deleterious substance governed by 21 C.F.R. 109.6 or any other substance governed by 21 C.F.R. 556
- (F) "Contagious or infectious disease" means any disease, including any foreign animal disease, or vector, capable of dangerously contagious or infectious diseases.
- (G) "Tuberculosis accredited free herd" is one that has passed at least two consecutive annual negative official tests for tuberculosis in accordance with the "Uniform Methods and Rules-Bovine Tuberculosis Eradication", and has no other evidence of bovine tuberculosis.

901:1-18-03 EXHIBITIONS: SANITATION, INSPECTION & RECORDS

- (A) Each entity sponsoring an exhibition shall have in attendance an approved veterinarian for the duration of the exhibit.
- (B) Each entity sponsoring an exhibition shall:
 - (1) Immediately, prior to an exhibition and under the direction of the approved veterinarian, thoroughly clean and disinfect each building, pen, ring or other enclosure in which animals are to be quartered for exhibition;

**All animals must be in place by
Monday July 10, 2023 at 11:59 pm and clean of all drugs.**

SENIOR FAIRBOARD RULE

**All 2023 Junior Fair Livestock "Champions and Grand Reserves"
in the following species Beef, Goats, Hogs, and Lamb
will go DIRECTLY to "Mahan Packing" for slaughter on the last day of fair.**

- (2) Have the approved veterinarian:
 - (a) Examine the certificate of veterinary inspection when required for an animal brought to the exhibition;
 - (b) Inspect within a reasonable time of arrival each animal brought to the exhibit for symptoms of any infectious or contagious diseases;
 - (c) Daily inspect each animal present at the exhibition for symptoms of infectious or contagious disease.
- (3) Maintain a record for one year from the date of the exhibition of each animal present at the exhibit. The record shall contain the name and address of the owner of each animal and the species and breed of the animal.
- (4) May order the immediate removal of any animal which in the opinion of the approved veterinarian places other animals at unacceptable risk of disease.

(C) An exemption from the requirements of paragraph (B)(1) of this rule may be requested from the department and will be granted when, in the judgment of the department, cleaning and disinfection will serve no purpose. By way of example only, cleaning and disinfection will generally serve no purpose in a newly constructed building that has never been occupied.

901:1-18-04 • EXHIBITORS

- (A) No person shall present for exhibition or exhibit an animal which he knows or has reason to suspect is affected with or has been exposed to a dangerously contagious or infectious disease or residue.
- (B) The owner or bailee of an animal with symptoms of an infectious or contagious disease shall, when directed by an exhibition official, the approved veterinarian, or an employee of the Ohio department of agriculture, immediately remove the animal from the exhibition premises.
- (C) Upon request, each person who presents an animal for exhibition or exhibits an animal shall present any certificate of veterinary inspection, registration certificates, vaccination certificate, and other documents to exhibition officials, the approved veterinarian, or an employee of the Ohio department of agriculture.
- (D) Each person who presents an animal for exhibition or exhibits an animal for which a certificate of veterinary inspection is required by rules 901:1-18-01 to 901:1-18-11 for the Administrative Code shall forward a copy of the certificate of veterinary inspection to the Ohio department of agriculture's division of animal industry.

901:1-18-05 • POULTRY AND FOWL

- (A) All turkeys, chickens and gamebirds moved within or imported into Ohio for exhibition must:
 - (1) Originate directly from a flock or hatchery which is a participant in the national poultry improvement plan for the eradication of disease and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirements of this paragraph; or
 - (2) Originate directly from a flock which has had a negative test for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease within twelve months preceding the opening date of exhibition and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph; or
 - (3) Have had a negative test for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease, within ninety days, preceding the opening date of the exhibition and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph; or
 - (4) Be tested for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease upon arrival at the exhibition by a tester approved by the Ohio department of agriculture and found negative.
- (B) The rapid whole blood test shall not be used to test turkeys for compliance with the requirements of paragraph (A)(2), (A)(3) and (A)(4) of this rule.
- (C) Waterfowl, doves and pigeons are exempt from this rule.

901:1-18-06 • CATTLE

- (A) Cattle moved within Ohio for exhibition:
 - (1.) The animals presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
- (B) All cattle imported into Ohio for exhibition must:
 - (1) be accompanied by a certificate of veterinarian inspection issued within 30 days preceding the exhibition opening date of the exhibition and be identified with official individual identification;
 - (2) Originate from a tuberculosis-accredited free herd, an accredited free state or zone, or a modified accredited advanced state or zone;

- (3) If originate from a modified accredited state or zone must comply with Rule 901:1-17-03 of the Administrative Code;
- (4) If originate from an accreditation preparatory or a non-accredited state or zone are prohibited from exhibition;
- (5) If from a brucellosis class A state or area/zone must be negative to an official brucellosis test within thirty days of the opening date of the exhibition unless: they are under 6 months of age, steers, or official vaccinates under twenty months of age (dairy) or twenty-four months of age (beef); and
- (6) If from a brucellosis class B or C state or area/zone must meet all requirements for pre-entry testing as specified in 9 C.F.R. 78.9 and obtain an Ohio permit prior to movement.

(C) Cattle from a brucellosis certified free herd or class free state or area/zone are not required to be brucellosis tested.

901:1-18-07 • GOATS

(A) Goats moved within Ohio for exhibition:

- (1) The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
- (2) All sexually intact animals and any wether eighteen months of age and older must be identified with an official identification as defined in rule 901:1-13-04 of the Ohio Administrative Code.

(B) Goats imported into Ohio for exhibition:

- (1) Must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinarian inspection issued within 30 days preceding the exhibition opening date of the exhibition and be identified with official individual identification;
- (2) The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease; and
- (3) The owner and the veterinarian must attest to the following statement written on the certificate of veterinary inspection "the goats in this shipment are not known to be under any movement restrictions because of scrapie."
- (4) Originate from a tuberculosis accredited free herd as defined in rule 901-18-02(G) of the Administrative Code for bovine tuberculosis eradication; or
- (5) Originate from a bovine accredited free state or zone, or a bovine modified accredited advanced state or zone; or
- (6) Originate from a bovine modified accredited state or zone must comply with rule 901:1-17-06 of the Administrative Code.

(C) If originated from a bovine accreditation preparatory or a bovine non-accredited state or zone are prohibited from exhibition.

901:1-18-08 • HORSES, MULES & PONIES

(A) Horses, mules and ponies moved within Ohio for exhibition:

- (1) If not under quarantine and if they are free of any signs of a contagious or infectious disease; and
- (2) If the animal is 12 months of age or older, the exhibition manager may require that the animal has been tested and classed negative to an official test for equine infectious anemia within 12 months of the opening date of the exhibition.

(B) Horses, mules and ponies imported into Ohio for exhibition:

- (1) Shall be accompanied by an officials certificate of veterinarian inspection issued within 30 days of the opening date of the exhibition and
- (2) If the animal is 12 months of age or older, it shall be accompanied by evidence the animal was negative to an official test for equine infectious anemia within 12 months of the opening date of the exhibition; and
- (3) Upon request by an authorized representative of the Ohio Department of Agriculture, the person responsible for each animal must make available a chronological list of dates, places and events attended by this animal within 30 days prior to entry into Ohio.

901:1-18-09 • SHEEP

(A) Sheep moved within Ohio for exhibition:

- (1) The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
- (2) All sexually intact animals and any wether eighteen months of age and older must be identified with an official identification as defined in rule 901:1-13-04 of the Ohio Administrative Code.

- (B)** Sheep imported into Ohio for exhibition:
- (1) Must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinarian inspection issued within 30 days preceding the date of the exhibition and be identified with official individual identification; and
 - (2) The animal presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease; and
 - (3) The owner and the veterinarian must attest to the following statement written on the certificate of veterinary inspection “the sheep in this shipment are not known to be under any movement restrictions because of scrapie.”

901:I-18-10 • SWINE

- (A)** Swine moved within Ohio for exhibition:
- (1) The animals presented for exhibition must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
 - (2) Will be exempt from the requirement of a certificate of veterinary inspection if they originate immediately and directly from a pseudorabies stage V area.
 - (3) Swine originating from a pseudorabies stage IV are shall:
 - (a) Be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the opening date of the exhibition; and
 - (b) Originate from a pseudorabies qualified herd; or
 - (c) Be negative to an official pseudorabies test within thirty days of the exhibition.
- (B)** Swine imported into Ohio for exhibition:
- (1) Must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within thirty days preceding the opening day of the exhibition; and
 - (a) Originate immediately and directly from a pseudorabies stage V area or an area or country recognized by the United States Department of Agriculture, animal plant health inspection service, veterinary services as pseudorabies free; or
 - (b) Originate immediately and directly from a pseudorabies stage IV area; and
 - (c) Be negative to an official pseudorabies test within thirty days of the exhibition.

901:I-18-11 • CAMELIDS

- (A)** Camelids including, but not limited to, llamas, alpacas and vicuñas moved within Ohio for exhibition purposes must show no symptoms or evidence of an infectious or contagious disease.
- (B)** Camelids including, but not limited to, llamas, alpacas and vicuñas imported into Ohio for exhibition must comply with rule 901:I-17-15 of the Administrative Code.

SHEEP AND GOAT EXHIBITION REQUIREMENTS

From The Ohio Department of Agriculture

NO PERSON MAY REMOVE OR TAMPER WITH THE OFFICIAL SHEEP AND GOAT IDENTIFICATION IN ACCORDANCE WITH 9 CFR PART 79.2

In order for Ohio to maintain Consistent State Status, Ohio sheep and goat exhibitions will be considered Interstate Commerce.

- A.** Requirements for bringing sheep and goats into Ohio for exhibition, sale or breeding
1. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within 30 days of the opening date of the exhibition.
 2. CVI must be signed by the owner and the veterinarian attesting to the following statement: “the sheep/goats in this shipment are not known to be under any movement restrictions because of scrapie.”
 3. Show no evidence of infections or contagious disease.
 4. All sheep and goats must be identified with official USDA identification (USDA approved sheep tags, USDA approved tattoos, or identification in the Scrapie Flock Certification Program)
 5. If the animal was born after January 1, 2002, it must have official USDA sheep/goat identification and be identified to the flock of birth.

- B. Identification requirements for sexually intact sheep and goats moving within Ohio for exhibition including sales.
1. Official USDA sheep/goat identification in the form of an approved tag or tattoo
 2. If the animal was born after January 1, 2002, it must have official USDA sheep/goat identification and be identified to the flock of birth either by an eartag or tattoo placed by the owner of the flock of birth, or a tag or tattoo placed by the purchaser.
 3. The identification requirements for flocks enrolled in the Voluntary Scrapie Flock Certification Program qualify as official USDA identification for exhibition and interstate movement; no other special identification is needed.

Ohio sheep and goat wethers that are less than 18 months of age exhibited on Ohio do not require USDA identification.

- C. "Exhibition" means any public show of animals which is sponsored by or under the control of an Ohio county or independent agricultural society OR the Ohio State Fair OR which is assembled for a period which exceeds 36 hours OR contains animals of origins other than Ohio. Includes show lamb and goat sales, consignment sales of livestock and jackpot shows.
- D. Responsibilities of an exhibition sponsor **(includes show lamb and goat sales, consignment sales of livestock and jackpot shows):**
1. Must have an approved veterinarian.
 2. Buildings, pens, stalls, rings and other enclosures in which animals are to be quartered for exhibition must be cleaned and disinfected prior to the exhibition under the direction of the approved veterinarian.
 3. The approved veterinarian is required to:
 - a. Examine CVI when required; and
 - b. Inspect livestock for infectious or contagious diseases within a reasonable time of arrival; and
 - c. Inspect livestock daily.
 4. May order the immediate removal of any animal which, in the opinion of the approved veterinarian, places other animals at unacceptable risk of disease.
 5. Maintain a record for one year from the date of the exhibition of each animal present at the exhibit. **Sheep and goat sale records must be kept for 5 years. (see (F) below)**
- E. For livestock purchased at an exhibition and moved out of state, an accredited veterinarian must issue a certificate of veterinary inspection before the animal move across the state line
- F. The Code of Federal Regulations requires that sheep and goat sale records be kept for 5 years by the seller, the buyer and the exhibition/sale sponsor. The records must contain the following information:
1. Name and address of the seller; telephone number if available; and
 2. Name and address of the buyer; telephone number if available; and
 3. Official identification when required as indicated in part A and B of these requirements; and
 4. Date of sale.

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Ohio's Livestock Tampering Exhibition Rules

901-19-01 Definitions.

As used in Chapter 901-19 of the Administrative Code:

- (A) "Accessory reproductive tissue" includes but is not limited to epididymis.
- (B) "Agricultural society" or "society" means a county agricultural society or an independent agricultural society that is organized under the laws of the state of Ohio.
- (C) "Approved" when used in reference to drugs, means approval by the United States food and drug administration for use in the species indicated on the label.
- (D) "Breed show or class" means a show or class limited to breeding stock of a specific breed of livestock.
- (E) "Class" means a division within a show or exhibition as defined by a sponsor.
- (F) "Department" means the department of agriculture created under section 121.02 of the Revised Code.
- (G) "Designee" when used in reference to an exhibitor, means a member of the exhibitor's family or household or any other registered or authorized representative of the exhibitor.
- (H) "Director" means the Ohio director of agriculture appointed pursuant to section 121.03 of the Revised Code.
- (I) "Drenching" means the act of using an instrument, including a bottle, placed in an animal's mouth to orally administer a liquid, food, or any other substance.
- (J) "Drug" means drug as defined in division (C) of section 4729.02 of the Revised Code and its metabolites.
- (K) "Drug use notification form" means the document completed in accordance with rule 901-19-06 of the Administrative Code.
- (L) "Exhibition drug residue legal" means an animal has not been administered a drug; or if administered a drug the withdrawal period has elapsed at the time the drug use notification form is completed.
- (M) "Exhibitor" means any person who shows, displays, or exhibits livestock at an exhibition.
- (N) "Extra label use" means the actual or intended use of a drug in livestock in a manner other than in accordance with the drug label directions.
- (O) "Fair" means the annual exhibition held by the Ohio expositions commission, pursuant to division (A)(1) of section 991.03 of the Revised Code, or a county agricultural society or independent agricultural society, as reported to the director pursuant to rule 901-5-11 of the Administrative Code.
- (P) "Family" means the immediate family of an exhibitor, including but not limited to the exhibitor's parent, step-parent, foster parent, grandparent, step-grandparent, foster grandparent, brother, sister, step-brother, step-sister, half-brother, half-sister, son, daughter, step-son, step-daughter, or guardian.
- (Q) "Grand champion" means the highest placing livestock entry of a show.
- (R) "Household" means the permanent residence address of the exhibitor.
- (S) "Immediately" means the time period between the cessation of administration of a drug and the point at which drug residues in the livestock are within tolerance levels or at zero tolerance, unless a safe level has been established by the United States food and drug administration.
- (T) "Internal rule" means any rule adopted by a sponsor or applicable to the sponsor's exhibition, and includes all mandatory rules and those optional rules from which the sponsor does not exempt itself or its exhibition.
- (U) "Junior livestock show" means a show limited to exhibitors nine years of age or in the third grade through nineteen years of age, or as authorized to participate in either 4-H, FFA, or other youth organization.
- (V) "Label" means the attached label or the accompanying brochure that lists the approved species, dose, route of administration, withdrawal time and any cautionary statement; a prescription label; the requirements of labeling for an extra label use drug as permitted by the United States food and drug administration; and information provided by the food animal residue avoidance databank (FARAD).
- (W) "Licensed livestock facility" means a livestock facility licensed pursuant to Chapter 943. of the Revised Code or a similar law of another state.
- (X) "Mandatory rule" means any rule adopted by the director relating to food safety or the health, safety, or welfare of livestock and from which a sponsor may not exempt itself or its exhibition.
- (Y) "Market flock style project" means ownership including an individual junior exhibitor, family of a junior exhibitor or a cooperative made up of junior exhibitors. Through this type of ownership, the junior exhibitor(s) are to care for, groom, and select any and all birds to be

- used in exhibitions as well as actively participate in any decision making processes for the flock.
- (Z) “Market livestock” means exhibition livestock bred, raised and intended for slaughter for food purposes.
- (AA) “Market poultry” means birds including, but not limited to, meat chickens, turkeys, geese and ducks.
- (BB) “Non-terminal show” means a show in which no livestock is required to be slaughtered.
- (CC) “Optional rule” means any rule adopted by the director from which a sponsor may exempt itself or its exhibition.
- (DD) “Outstanding market project” means the exhibitor ranking highest in the outstanding market project competition in a show.
- (EE) “Over the counter drug” means any drug that lawfully may be purchased without a prescription.
- (FF) “Partial terminal show” means a show in which no fewer than the grand champion and reserve grand champion in each show or market class of livestock are sent directly to slaughter or to a licensed livestock facility no later than or immediately following the conclusion of the exhibition.
- (GG) “Prescription” means prescription as defined in division (G) of section 4729.02 of the Revised Code.
- (HH) “Quarantine” means isolation pursuant to section 941.07 of the Revised Code.
- (II) “Reserve grand champion” means the second highest placing livestock entry of a show.
- (JJ) “Residue” means residues as defined in division (I) of section 941.01 of the Revised Code.
- (KK) “Show” means that part of the exhibition restricted to exhibiting a single species and category of livestock such as, by way of example, but not limited to, market steer, dairy goats and market lambs.
- (LL) “Slick clipping” or “body shaving” means having hair that is less than one half inch in length on the body of market hogs.
- (MM) “Terminal show” means a show in which all livestock entered in the show are sent directly to slaughter or to a licensed livestock facility no later than or immediately following the conclusion of the exhibition.
- (NN) “Tolerance level” means the detectable level of a residue or other substance in livestock, in a livestock test sample, or in food, as that word is defined in division (A)(2) of section 3715.01 of the Revised Code, in a level less than or equal to the maximum level determined to be safe, acceptable or non-violative by the United States food and drug administration.
- (OO) “Unlawful substance” means any of the following:
- (1) Any drug prohibited by division (E)(1)(b) of section 901.76 of the Revised Code; or
 - (2) A substance which is not normally found in or does not naturally occur in livestock; or
 - (3) A substance which is normally found in or does naturally occur in livestock, but is detected or discerned in an amount or area greater than normal; or
 - (4) Any drug required to be listed, but which is not listed on a drug use notification form; or
 - (5) Any drug present in an animal regardless of how the drug came to be present if the drug was not administered under paragraph (A), (B) or (C) of rule 901-19-04 of the Administrative Code.
- (PP) “Veterinarian” means any person licensed to practice veterinary medicine under Chapter 4741. of the Revised Code or under the similar laws of another state.
- (QQ) “Withdrawal period” or “withdrawal time” means the interval from the time livestock is removed from medication until all residues are within the tolerance level.

901-19-02 Types of shows; slaughter.

This is a mandatory rule.

- (A) The sponsor of an exhibition shall designate each of the shows held at the exhibition as one of the following types: terminal show, partial terminal show, or non-terminal show.
- (B) All of the following junior livestock shows or classes at a fair must be terminal shows or partial terminal shows unless at least thirty days prior to the opening of the show, the sponsor has submitted a written request to exempt a show from this provision, and the director has provided written authorization granting this request prior to the start of the fair:
- (1) Market beef steer;
 - (2) Market hog;
 - (3) Market lamb;
 - (4) Market dairy steer;
 - (5) Veal Calf; and
 - (6) Market Goat.
- (C) All livestock which participate in a terminal show shall be consigned to slaughter either at

the conclusion of the show or immediately following the exhibition.

- (D) In a partial terminal show at least the grand champion and the reserve grand champion shall be slaughtered. Prior to the show, the sponsor of the exhibition may require that additional livestock from a partial terminal show shall be slaughtered. The livestock shall be consigned to slaughter either at the conclusion of the show or immediately following the exhibition.
- (E) All livestock required to be slaughtered under this rule shall be slaughtered at a meat establishment either licensed by the department or granted inspection by the United States department of agriculture.
- (F) Notwithstanding paragraphs (B), (C) and (D) of this rule, livestock required to be slaughtered under this rule may, at the option of the sponsor of the exhibition, be consigned to a licensed livestock facility for sale provided that:
- (I) The livestock is consigned either at the conclusion of the show or immediately following the exhibition; and,
- (2) The livestock is sold only for slaughter.
- (G) From the beginning of the exhibition until departure for slaughter or consignment to a licensed livestock facility, the exhibitor or the exhibitor's designee shall be responsible for caring for the livestock.
- (H) Livestock destined for slaughter or consignment to a licensed livestock facility shall not be removed from the exhibition grounds until the livestock is transported to slaughter, to the licensed livestock facility, or until the sponsor approves movement of the livestock to another secure area for:
- (I) Disease control in accordance with paragraph (B)(4) of rule 901:1-18-03 of the Administrative Code; and
- (2) Quarantine for residue to allow a withdrawal time as determined by the approved fair veterinarian or in accordance with the instructions listed on the drug use notification form to elapse and may be subject to testing.
- (I) All livestock destined for slaughter shall be subject to testing by the director in accordance with section 901.73 of the Revised Code.
- (J) Livestock carcasses passing inspection may be released for normal disposition.
- (K) During inspection or testing, if the livestock carcass is preliminarily determined to have been tampered with or found to contain an unlawful substance, one of the following shall occur:
- (I) If the livestock carcass must be trimmed or reconditioned to comply with the meat inspection requirements, the carcass shall be trimmed and reconditioned and released to the exhibitor, unless the successful bidder accepts the trimmed or reconditioned carcass.
- (2) If the livestock carcass cannot be trimmed or reconditioned, it shall be condemned in accordance with the meat inspection requirements.
- (L) Livestock entered in or eligible for a carcass contest prior to or during a terminal, partial terminal or non-terminal show must be exhibition drug residue legal at the time of show and eligible for immediate slaughter.

901-19-03 Auction sales at terminal or partial terminal shows.

This is a mandatory rule.

- (A) A sponsor may hold an auction sale of livestock exhibited at a terminal or partial terminal show.
- (B) An exhibitor who exhibits livestock at a terminal show or partial terminal show consents to participating in the subsequent auction sale.
- (C) All bidders at an auction sale following a terminal show or partial terminal show consent to the slaughter of the livestock or delivery to a licensed livestock facility.
- (D) Title to livestock sold at an auction sale and subsequently presented for slaughter or sale at a licensed livestock facility shall remain vested in the exhibitor. If the exhibitor is not the owner, the title to the livestock shall remain vested in the owner until the livestock has been passed by inspection and released in accordance with paragraphs (K)(1) and (K)(2) of rule 901-19-02 of the Administrative Code and passes all testing performed by or at the direction of the department or the sponsor.
- (E) At the discretion of the sponsor, the sponsor may collect the sale proceeds from the successful bidder and retain the proceeds until the carcass of the livestock has been released, or may allow the successful bidder to withhold payment of the proceeds until the carcass is released. In the event the carcass is not released, the sponsor shall return the sale proceeds to the successful bidder.
- (F) Prior to the auction, the sponsor shall announce the identification of the exhibition livestock which have been administered drugs for which the withdrawal time has not elapsed.

901-19-04 Prohibited practices.

This is a mandatory rule.

No person shall:

- (A) Administer or cause or permit to be administered a prescription drug to livestock either immediately before an exhibition or during an exhibition unless the prescription drug is administered:
 - (1) By or under the supervision and direction of a veterinarian;
 - (2) Only in accordance with label directions;
 - (3) In conjunction with a valid veterinarian-client-patient relationship;
 - (4) For a valid medical purpose; and,
 - (5) A drug use notification form is completed and filed in accordance with the applicable requirements of rule 901-19-06 of the Administrative Code.
- (B) Administer or cause or permit to be administered an over the counter drug to livestock either immediately before an exhibition or during an exhibition unless the over the counter drug is administered:
 - (1) By or under the supervision or direction of the exhibitor, the exhibitor's designee, the owner of the livestock or a veterinarian;
 - (2) Only in accordance with label directions;
 - (3) Only for a valid medical purpose; and,
 - (4) A drug use notification form is completed and filed in accordance with the applicable requirements of rule 901-19-06 of the Administrative Code.
- (C) Administer or cause or permit to be administered either a prescription drug or an over the counter drug other than in accordance with the drug's label directions unless extra label use of the drug is:
 - (1) By or under the supervision and direction of a veterinarian;
 - (2) Only in accordance with the extra label directions provided by the veterinarian;
 - (3) In conjunction with a valid veterinarian-client-patient relationship;
 - (4) Only for a valid medical purpose;
 - (5) A drug use notification form is completed and filed in accordance with the applicable requirements of rule 901-19-06 of the Administrative Code; and,
 - (6) An extended withdrawal time is assigned to the drug by the veterinarian as part of the extra label directions and reported on the drug use notification form.
- (D) Show, sell, or offer for sale any livestock which contains an unlawful substance or has been subjected to unacceptable practices as outlined in rule 901-19-03 of the Administrative Code.
- (E) Show any livestock which contains a drug in an amount which exceeds the tolerance level if established or safe level; or, a drug for which the withdrawal period has not elapsed unless administered in accordance with paragraph (A), (B) or (C) of this rule.
- (F) Sell or offer for sale in an auction at a terminal or partial terminal show an animal that contains a drug in an amount which exceeds the tolerance level if established or safe level; or, a drug for which the withdrawal period has not elapsed unless administered in accordance with paragraph (A), (B) or (C) of this rule.
- (G) Exhibit an animal which has been tranquilized.
- (H) Make a false statement on a drug use notification form.
- (I) Fail to file or update a drug use notification form as required by 901-19-06 of the Administrative Code.
- (J) Negligently cause an unlawful substance to be present in an animal.
- (K) Fail to sign a chain of custody form.
- (L) Violate a mandatory rule.
- (M) Violate any optional rule from which a sponsor or exhibition did not exempt itself.
- (N) Fail to render assistance as provided by section 901.73 of the Revised Code.

901-19-05 Responsibilities of an exhibition sponsor.

This is a mandatory rule.

- (A) Every sponsor of an exhibition shall appoint a person as its records official. The records official shall receive and maintain the drug use notification forms filed under rule 901-19-06 of the Administrative Code.
- (1) The records official shall reject any drug use notification form that is incomplete, illegible or unsigned. At the close of the exhibition the records official shall turn over the drug use notification forms received by him to the sponsor.
- (2) The sponsor shall maintain all drug use notification forms for a period of one year from the close of an exhibition. The drug use notification forms shall be made available to the department for inspection and copying upon request.
- (3) Review the submitted drug use notification forms prior to the show for compliance with paragraph (I) of rule 901-19-06 and rule 901-19-07 of the Administrative Code.
- (4) Review the submitted drug use notification forms for compliance with paragraph (B) of rule 901-19-38 of the Administrative Code if applicable.

- (B) The sponsor of an exhibition shall provide information requested by the director on a form prescribed by the director at least ten days before the start of the exhibition.
- (C) Prior to the start of an exhibition, the sponsor shall establish a method of identifying each animal in a terminal, partial terminal, and non-terminal show and maintain a chain of custody for each market livestock animal from the show through consignment to either slaughter or a licensed livestock facility for sale. The sponsor shall maintain a record of the identity of each animal and its chain of custody for a period of one year from the date of the last day of an exhibition.
- (D) All county and independent agricultural societies and the Ohio expositions commission shall print Chapter 901:1-18 of the Administrative Code (Ohio's livestock health exhibition rules) in their premium book for the current year.
- (E) The sponsor of a county or independent agricultural society or the Ohio exposition commission shall provide a livestock exhibitor or an adult advisor, upon request, a copy of Chapter 901-19 of the Administrative Code and print in their current premium book the following notice: "Chapter 901-19 of the Administrative Code (Ohio's livestock tampering exhibition rules) will be made available to a livestock exhibitor or an adult advisor, upon request."
- (F) The sponsor may elect to include the entire text of chapter 901-19 of the Administrative Code within their premium book.
- (G) All other exhibitions shall provide to exhibitors, upon request, a copy of Chapters 901:1-18 and 901-19 of the Administrative Code and shall include the following statement in at least one written announcement prior to the beginning of the exhibition: "The exhibition's management will provide, upon request of an exhibitor, a copy of Chapters 901:1-18 (Ohio's livestock health exhibition rules) and 901-19 (Ohio's livestock tampering exhibition rules) of the Administrative Code."

901-19-06 Drug use notification.

This is a mandatory rule.

- (A) The exhibitor and the owner of an animal are jointly and severally responsible for completing and filing out the drug use notification form in the manner required by this rule.
- (B) The drug use notification form shall be signed by either the exhibitor or the owner. If the person signing the form is a minor child, the form shall be cosigned by a parent or guardian of the minor child.
- (C) A drug use notification form shall be completed for every animal from which a test sample is collected at every terminal and partial terminal or non-terminal show, and for every animal that is administered a drug either immediately before or during an exhibition.
- (D) The director shall require a drug use notification form to be completed for the following livestock exhibited in a junior livestock show:
 - (1) Market steer;
 - (2) Market hog;
 - (3) Market lamb;
 - (4) Veal calf;
 - (5) Market dairy steer;
 - (6) Market goats;
 - (7) Market poultry;
 - (8) Lactating dairy cattle; and
 - (9) Lactating goats.
- (E) The drug use notification form shall be filed with the records official prior to the show in which the animal is entered.
- (F) The director may require a drug use notification form to be completed for livestock exhibited at any type of show including a non-terminal show.
- (G) If the information on the form regarding drug use changes or if a drug is subsequently administered at any time after the drug use notification form is filed, an updated drug use notification form shall immediately be filed with the records official.
- (H) No person shall submit an incomplete, illegible or unsigned drug use notification form.
- (I) When a drug use notification form submitted to a records official for livestock is incomplete, illegible, or unsigned neither the exhibitor nor the owner shall, until the defect is corrected:
 - (1) Receive any prizes or awards from shows in which the livestock was exhibited prior to the time the drug use notification form was to be filed.
 - (2) Participate in any shows or sales held subsequent to the time the drug use notification form was to be filed.

901-19-07 Quality assurance.

This is a mandatory rule.

- (A) Except as stated in paragraph (B) of this rule, sponsors shall require exhibitors at fairs sponsored by county or independent agricultural societies or the Ohio exposition

commission to annually attend or complete a quality assurance program sponsored and conducted cooperatively by the exhibition sponsor, Ohio state university extension, Ohio agricultural education, or agricultural commodity organizations.

- (B) At the discretion of Ohio state university extension, or Ohio agricultural education, an exhibitor may pass a test based on the appropriate skill level for their age (twelve to fourteen or fifteen to eighteen) under the supervision of Ohio state university extension or Ohio agricultural education before exhibiting terminal or partial terminal market livestock, including market poultry, lactating dairy cattle and lactating goats in a junior livestock show. Youth who pass the test will be exempt from annual quality assurance re-certification until they move to the next age bracket or they are no longer a junior exhibitor (nineteen years of age or older on January first of their last year). Minimum standards for youth food animal quality assurance are as set forth in appendix A to this rule.
- (c) Exhibitors who fail to attend or complete a quality assurance program or fail to pass the exam as outlined in paragraph (B) of this rule may be subject to the disciplinary actions listed in rule 901-19-21 of the Administrative Code.

901-19-09 Drug residues in non-terminal show animals.

This is a mandatory rule.

- (A) A person may, notwithstanding paragraph (E) of rule 901-19-04 of the Administrative Code, show at a non-terminal show an animal which has been administered a drug provided they are in compliance with all of the following:
- (1) The drug is a prescription drug or an extra label use of a drug and the drug is prescribed by a veterinarian pursuant to a valid veterinarian-client-patient relationship;
- (2) The drug is administered or used only in accordance with label directions or the prescription;
- (3) The drug is administered or used only for medical purposes; and,
- (4) A drug use notification form is completed and filed in accordance with the applicable requirements of rule 901-19-06 of the Administrative Code.
- (B) Milk or other food obtained from livestock which has been administered or treated with a drug and permitted to exhibit pursuant to paragraph (A) of this rule, shall not be used for human consumption.

901-19-10 Testing requirements and test results.

This is a mandatory rule.

- (A) Urine, blood, tissue and other test samples shall be collected in accordance with the department's protocol for the collection of livestock test samples at exhibitions. Test samples may be collected before, during, or immediately after a show. Deviation from the protocol shall be noted.
- (B) The director may at his discretion, collect any urine, blood, tissue, or other test samples from exhibition animals at the time of slaughter.

901-19-11 Humane treatment of livestock.

This is a mandatory rule.

- (A) A person shall treat livestock in a humane manner and in accordance with acceptable commercial practices so as to protect the health, safety, and welfare of the livestock.
- (B) All exhibitors shall comply with and abide by the policy statement and "code of practices" of the Ohio livestock coalition.

901-19-12 Acceptable practices.

This is a mandatory rule.

The following practices are deemed acceptable to protect and promote the health, safety, and welfare of livestock:

- (A) Adding caffeine free soda pop, gelatin, or other sweeteners to drinking water in nominal amounts to encourage water consumption;
- (B) Hoof trimming;
- (C) Cosmetic dehorning in market class livestock;
- (D) Using collodion as a teat sealant, but for no longer than eighteen hours;
- (E) Adding molasses or other sweeteners to feed to encourage consumption;
- (F) Properly administered and approved growth implants;
- (G) Castration;
- (H) Beak trimming;
- (I) Dehorning;
- (J) Tattooing;
- (K) Hot or freeze branding;
- (L) Humane ringing;

- (M) Tail docking;
- (N) Ear notching;
- (O) Ear tagging;
- (P) Shearing;
- (Q) Drenching of livestock for a medical condition at an exhibition when diagnosed by a licensed veterinarian;
- (R) Acceptable surgery, including clamps, bands and chemical castration; and
- (S) Application of ice, ice packs, cold packs, or cold compresses prescribed to relieve heat stress or a medical condition diagnosed by a licensed veterinarian at an exhibition.

901-19-13 Unacceptable practices.

This is a mandatory rule.

The following practices are detrimental to the health, safety, and welfare of livestock and are prohibited:

- (A) Applying any electrical, mechanical, or other appliance to livestock repeatedly or for a prolonged time period in violation of 9 C.F.R. 313.2 (1979);
- (B) Hitting, striking, beating, or otherwise impacting livestock that induces swelling or enhances, transforms or changes the true conformation, configuration, or appearance of the livestock;
- (C) Applying any electrical, mechanical, or other appliance that enhances, transforms, or changes the true conformation, configuration, or appearance of the livestock, unless prescribed by the exhibition veterinarian;
- (D) Plugging of teats;
- (E) Sealing of teats using unapproved substances or for longer than eighteen hours using approved substances;
- (F) Injecting material into udders or teats for non-medical purposes or otherwise artificially modifying the appearance or conformation of the udder or teat;
- (G) Using ice, ice packs, cold packs, or cold compresses internally or externally other than in accordance with paragraph (S) of rule 901-19-12 of the Administrative Code;
- (H) Using a stomach tube or pump for any purpose other than for the relief of tympany or gas on the day of exhibiting;
- (I) Drenching of livestock at an exhibition is prohibited except as permitted under paragraph (Q) of rule 901-19-12 of the Administrative Code.

901-19-19 Absolute liability.

This is a mandatory rule.

- (A) Both the exhibitor and the owner of livestock are absolutely liable to discipline under rule 901-19-21 of the Administrative Code for the presence of an unlawful substance in livestock and unacceptable practices done to livestock.
- (B) If the exhibitor or the owner was a minor child at the time the unlawful substance or unacceptable practice was detected, the parent or guardian of the person shall also be absolutely liable to discipline under rule 901-19-21 of the administrative Code for the presence of an unlawful substance in livestock and unacceptable practices done to livestock.
- (C) The director or the sponsor when imposing discipline under paragraph (A) of this rule upon a person, may mitigate the discipline imposed based upon one or more of the following facts if established.
 - (1) The person did not introduce the unlawful substance into the animal or do any unacceptable practices to the livestock;
 - (2) The person had no actual or constructive knowledge that the unlawful substance was introduced into the livestock or that unacceptable practices had been done to the livestock;
 - (3) The unlawful substance was not introduced into the livestock and the unacceptable practices were not done to the livestock through the person's negligence.

901-19-21 Disciplinary action.

This is a mandatory rule.

- (A) Any person who violates a provision of sections 901.70 to 901.76 of the Revised Code or any provision of this chapter is subject to any of the following disciplinary actions:
 - (1) Disqualification from any exhibition;
 - (2) Disqualification of the exhibition livestock from any exhibition;
 - (3) Continuing education;
 - (4) Written letter of reprimand;
 - (5) Forfeiture or return of awards, prizes, premiums, or proceeds; or
 - (6) Pre-exhibition drug testing.
- (B) Disqualification may include any or all shows and classes and may be for any number of years.
- (C) Anyone who violates rule 901-19-07 of the Administrative Code may be given a letter of reprimand for the first offense.

901-19-31 Responsibilities of and assistance to junior fair exhibitors.

This is an optional rule.

- (A) A junior livestock show exhibitor shall be responsible for the continuous care, grooming, and preparation of the livestock entered in the junior livestock show.
- (B) An exhibitor may receive assistance in the care, grooming, and preparation of the livestock entered in the junior livestock show, provided that the assistance shall be limited to explanation or demonstration provided by the following:
 - (1) Family members;
 - (2) Household members;
 - (3) Advisors or adult volunteers of 4-H or FFA in the exhibitor's club or county;
 - (4) Vocational agriculture instructors;
 - (5) County extension agents;
 - (6) Department representatives;
 - (7) Veterinarians;
 - (8) Members of the exhibitor's 4-H club, FFA chapter, or other youth organizations; and
 - (9) Guest speakers of the 4-H, FFA, or other youth organizations.
- (C) Any person not specified in paragraph (B) of this rule who provides assistance to a junior livestock show exhibitor shall register in writing with the sponsor. The responsibility to register rests with the exhibitor. An assistant may register for more than one exhibitor. Failure to register constitutes grounds for disciplinary action against the exhibitor. Assistance shall be limited to explanation and minimal demonstration.

901-19-32 Breed shows or classes.

This is an optional rule.

Unless otherwise modified by a mandatory rule, the rules of the breed association shall be accepted grooming practices for that particular breed's show or class.

901-19-33 Prohibited grooming practices.

This is a mandatory rule.

The following grooming practices are prohibited in junior market livestock shows unless those grooming practices are permitted under rule 901-19-32 of the Administrative Code:

- (A) Using any substance to enhance or change the color of the livestock, including the livestock's hide or hooves;
- (B) Adding any substance externally to build up, change or alter the shape or conformation of the livestock, including by way of example but not limited to rope, false hair, graphite, hemp, and powders;
- (C) Pigmented grooming aides or materials; and
- (D) Slick clipping or body shaving of market hogs except on the ears and tails.

901-19-34 Outstanding market project competition.

This is an optional rule.

An exhibition may provide for an outstanding market project competition in one or more classes.

The competition may include an evaluation of the livestock, demonstration of the exhibitor's showmanship abilities, or a skillathon or interview judging. The skillathon or interview judging may include demonstration of the exhibitor's knowledge of quality assurance principles, as set forth in an industry publication or in a publication such as the "caring for animals" handout or by viewing the "caring for animals video" available from a county extension office.

901-19-35 Recognition of disciplinary actions.

This is an optional rule.

- (A) Disciplinary action by a sponsor against a person for a violation of sections 901.70 to 901.76 of the Revised Code or Chapter 901-19 of the Administrative Code shall be given full faith and credit and shall be honored at all exhibitions.
- (B) A person who has been convicted of violating sections 901.70 to 901.76 of the Revised Code shall be prohibited from participating in any exhibition for a minimum period of three years.

901-19-38 False, deceptive or unacceptable practices.

This is a mandatory rule.

The following are unacceptable practices:

- (A) Castration of livestock for purposes of this rule which exceed the following criteria:
- (I) Cattle over eight months of age;

- (2) Swine over seventy-five pounds; or
- (3) Sheep over seventy-five pounds.
- (B) Showing any market livestock which has been treated in accordance with paragraph (A), (B) or (C) of rule 901-19-04 of the Administrative Code when a side effect of the drug conceals, enhances, transforms, or changes the true conformation or condition of the livestock.
- (C) Any natural occurrence or surgical process which results in testicular tissue remaining in the body of exhibition livestock except rabbits and poultry.

901-19-39 Ownership requirements.

- (A) No exhibitor shall register, enter, or exhibit in a junior livestock exhibition any of the livestock listed in paragraphs (A)(1) to (A)(7) of this rule unless the household, as defined in paragraph (R) of rule 901-19-01, at which the exhibitor is registered at has owned the livestock for not less than the length of time listed:
 - (1) Market steers - one hundred fifty days;
 - (2) Market dairy steers - one hundred fifty days;
 - (3) Market hogs - sixty days;
 - (4) Market lambs - sixty days;
 - (5) Market goats - sixty days;
 - (6) Veal calves - sixty days; and
 - (7) Market poultry - within five days of hatch including all individual participants in a cooperative.
- (B) No exhibitor shall register, enter, or exhibit livestock in a junior breeding livestock exhibition unless the household, as defined in paragraph (R) of rule 901-19-01, at which the exhibitor is registered at has owned the livestock or has had the livestock registered under the exhibitor's name for at least sixty days.
- (C) For any exhibition other than those listed in paragraphs (A)(1) to (A)(7) and paragraph (B) of this rule, the length of time a person shall own livestock before the person may register, enter, or exhibit the livestock at an exhibition may be set by either the sponsor of the exhibition or a breed association.

901-19-40 Meetings of the advisory committee on livestock exhibitions.

- (A) Board meetings
A regular meeting of the committee shall be held at least once annually after the fifteenth day of October and before the first day of December. The committee may meet at other times as the chairperson or a majority of the committee members considers appropriate, provided the chairperson gives members written notice of any meeting at least seven days prior to the meeting.
- (B) Notice of meetings
- (1) Regular meetings: Notice of all of the advisory board's regularly scheduled meetings, including date, starting time and location shall be sent to the committee members by either regular or electronic mail at least seven days prior to the meeting, and will be posted on the department's web site www.agri.ohio.gov and may also be provided to Gongwer or Hannah news service for website at least ten days in advance of all regularly scheduled meeting.
- (2) Special meetings: Notice of date, time, place, and purpose of any special meetings shall be placed on the department's website www.agri.ohio.gov and may also be provided to Gongwer or Hannah news service, as well as sent to media outlets that requested such information, at least twenty-four hours prior to said meeting.
- (3) Emergency meetings: Notice of date, time, location and purpose of all emergency meeting shall be given to all news media who requested prior notification, and on the department's website www.agri.ohio.gov.
- (C) Any person may obtain prior notice of the date, time, and location of any regularly scheduled, special, emergency, or any of the aforementioned meetings when a particular type of business is to be discussed by requesting prior notification in writing from the "Ohio Department of Agriculture, Office of Animal Health, 8995 East Main Street, Reynoldsburg, Ohio 43068"; or by calling the animal health division at (614) 728-6220.
